Celebrate our history with media poineer guest speakers, music performances by Catherine Satour and Baamba, and our host MCs Lola Forester and Patrick Ah Kit.

CATHERINE SATOUR

Central Australian songwriter, Catherine Satour, has music in her blood, having played her first gig at 9 years old with her father Bunna Lawrie and his legendary band Coloured Stone. Catherine is an Arrente and Mirning woman living in Alice Springs. Catherine shares experiences of love and place through songs that fuse rock and soul. She released her selftitled EP and single Set The Tone in 2016. Catherine spearheaded the production and release of Central Australia's first compilation album of Indigenous female artists – Desert Divas; Volume 1 – in October 2012. She is also known for her role as TV presenter on the NITV arts and culture programs 'Around the Traps' and 'Our Songs'.

BAAMBA

With his trademark hat banded by weaved string with the Indigenous colours of black, red and yellow, Stephen 'Baamba' Albert is synonomous with old Broome. He is an Indigenous Australian actor and singer who is loved for his performances spanning four decades. He is an inspiration to his community and is one of the great modern generation leaders. Baamba was one of the founders of the Broome Aboriginal Media Assocation which has led to the development of the remarkable Goolarri Media Enterprises which produces film, radio and television. He is also known for his roles in Bran Nue Dae, Corrugation Road, Wongan Country, Twelfth Night and The Circuit. ES

PATRICK AH KIT



JOHN 'TADAM' LOCKYER

Tdam is the Chairperson for Indigenous Remote Communications Association (IRCA) and lives in Broome, Western Australia. He has been involved in advocating for digital inclusion in the Pilbara and Kimberly region, and has worked with Gumala Radio, Ngaarda Media and Pilbara and Kimberly Aboriginal Media (PAKAM). In both 2014 and 2015, Tadam was part of a delegation to Canberra to meet with the Department of Communications to discuss the barriers and take up of communications technologies in remote Top End communities.



Dot West has a long media history within the Kimberley and has played a major role in the training and development of the industry. Dot has also been instrumental in assisting national growth and development of Indigenous media. Dot has served on numerous boards – as the Inaugural Vice Chairperson of NITV, Screenwest, Australian International Documentary Conference, the National Indigenous Radio Service, Pilbara and Kimberley Aboriginal Media Association, Goolarri Media Enterprises, Ramu Productions, Special Broadcasting Service (SBS) and Indigenous Remote Communications Association (IRCA).
